These are the questions we need to be reflecting on and asking ourselves.


We are not here for our own benefit. We are here to love God and each other, and in doing so will find our own true and deepest needs are met – hope, peace and joy will be ours and theirs.

## A View from The Pews by Dominic Hall

I have been reflecting on our June Bible Bash and Prayer Slam. I did the wee small hours slot – a sucker for punishment – but I am glad that I did. First, it meant there were very few people to hear me strangle the names of Melchizedek and Tychicus; secondly, talking into a quiet church is magical; but mostly, because it was hard to be awake, alert and focussed at 3am!

Coming to church is, if we're honest, relatively easy for most of us. We get up, have a shower, get dressed, eat some breakfast and pop along to church. It is lovely to catch up with friends, share news of our week and engage in some life affirming worship. The times when it is harder are, I think, when it becomes truly special.

For most people in the country, coming to church, other than to sing carols at Christmas, revolves around three key human rites of passage – baptisms, weddings and funerals. For those involved in the ceremonies there are unique difficulties and opportunities.

Baptisms often involve new parents trusting their children to others – be it the vicar hoping not to drop the baby; or the wider Christian community as we pledge to be there for the newly baptised.

Weddings require two people making a lifelong commitment to one another and giving up their past life where they may have wanted to 'play the field'.

Funerals mark that moment of closure when we give our loved ones back to God and come to realise their physical presence is lost to us for ever.

All these services, along with the Bible Bash and other times in the year, are tough and require us to search for an inner strength. And that, it seems to me, is where we most often find God.


Young parents find God in the joy of welcome and in the hope that the trials they will face with their children are neither unique nor to be suffered alone.

Newlyweds find God in the love of their family and friends celebrating and supporting them as they adjust to a new life together.

Mourners find God in the comfort of knowing the pain they feel is a mark of love and that its rawness will soften and bring lighter moments of remembrance and reflection.

As for the Bible Bash, the church may have been largely empty at 3 am but God was in the voices of those who had read earlier and in the anticipation of the voices to come. The difficulty of the task is often overcome by the reassuring presence of God and the warm hug of the community – and that is a lovely feeling.

## **ECO CHURCH NEWS**

At the July meeting of the PCC, we put forward a proposal to open an online bank account for the church with the Co-op. The Co-op bank is one of the few banks that operate an ethical policy for investing the funds held with them. We are pleased that



PCC agreed to the proposal and that will now be taken forward.

These were some of our reasons for putting forward the proposal:

- Giving our custom to banks that invest in fossil fuels means more fossil fuels are burned. The UK's 4 largest banks, HSBC, Barclays, Lloyds and NatWest have all been among the world's biggest financiers of fossil fuels.
- Poorer communities are often hit hardest by climate change. The World Economic Forum reports climate change may cause an additional 14.5 million deaths by 2050.
- As the people of God, we are called to care for those most in need. Switching banks is one simple and easy action to take to do this! Funding climate change is not good stewardship of the money God has given us. It is not loving to people and the planet.


## Diocese of Leeds Mothers' Union

At the Annual General Meeting of the above which was held in June 2025 at Skipton, the finances and work undertaken by MU branches in our Diocese during the previous year, were documented and published in the minutes issued to all branches.

Members are being thanked for their amazing work during 2024, when the number of people helped by them was a staggering 10,575. This help is given in their churches and at prisons, hospitals, refuges, food banks and other community projects and is impossible to measure exactly. What is evident is the love and care for the needy shown in a variety of different situations.

One of our most supported MU projects is for the AFIA caravans at Filey where 33 holidays were provided during 2024, for 60 adults and 45 children. Many of these people were able to re-assess their lives, the break away from their day-to-day life allowing them to be free from stress and the situations that they were in at home. Many thanks go to our MU members for their continual financial support.
