The Vicarage

Dear Friends

I have a practice during Advent of slowly reading one of the Gospels (about a chapter a day, depending on the Gospel – Matthew, Mark, Luke or John) in the run-up to Christmas. This helps give me a grounding in the whole of Jesus's life as we approach the celebration of his birth. I find it helpful, within the madness of preparing for Christmas celebrations, to remember the significance of his life, death and resurrection as well as the amazing events of his beginning.

It is good, I think, to have these kinds of practices built into our Advent or perhaps New Year routines. Otherwise, we end up being just carried along by events in December – the office parties, children's events, carol concerts, and so on - and counting down to Christmas or New Year with maybe just a chocolate-a-day from the calendar to anchor us in the present and remind us what's coming.

For me, reading a Gospel presents a strange juxtaposition whilst travelling through Advent: hearing again Jesus's teaching about the poor whilst buying presents, working unsustainably hard whilst Jesus feeds 5,000 and talks about how his burden is light, trying to plan and run services to attract people to church whilst Jesus has to stop his disciples sending people away, the feeling of getting closer to Christmas and celebrating whilst sensing the horror that awaits the new-born baby in the manger, and then finally as we get there and the child is born, I also get to experience the new life that Jesus's resurrection offers to all.

The setting of the events of Jesus's life beside our Advent period of waiting and preparing which, with all the practicalities of getting 'sorted' for Christmas involves never ceases to be challenging. It brings my experience into dialogue with the Lord himself: 'Why is work so hard if your burden is light?'; 'How do I hold together the child in the manger with the man on the cross and the empty tomb?'

It's been a fruitful reflection every year I have read a Gospel in Advent. You may have similar habits for the runup to Christmas or perhaps as a New Year's resolution. But if you don't, might you consider adopting my practice, perhaps just as a trial run for this year? Try to allow the stories to speak to you and interrogate those Advent days, and let them move you to prayer.

I'd love to hear how you get on, and always, if there's anything I can do to help you with it, please let me know.

When it arrives, God bless you and Happy Christmas!



ZERO WASTE SHOPPING

It was great to welcome Jeanne-Claire to our recent meeting when we discussed zero waste shops, cycle racks and our planting plans. Here is some information about zero waste shops locally:

Burley in Wharfedale ~ **Waste Not** is on the main street, with free parking directly outside. Closed Monday and Friday.

Ilkley ~ Waste Not (sister shop to Burley) is on Wells Road opposite Friends of Ham. One hour free parking outside the shop. Even better, go by train - it's very handy for the station! Website is: https://wastenot.tillex.co.uk/app?vrp=29 Both these shops are owned by Charlotte who works mainly in the Burley shop, with her sister Tillie in the Ilkley shop.

Closed Monday.

Otley ~ Like Nana Did is in Orchard Gate, open Monday to Saturday every week, also the last Sunday of the month. They offer a delivery service through Shop Otley.

Horsforth \sim **Zero Muda** on the main road (New Road Side) in Horsforth. They open 7 days per week. There is parking on the main street.. They offer an organic veg box collection service (*Kirkstall Community Farm*) which the farm will deliver to them and you can collect every Friday. They also offer a wide range of loose organic fruit /veg that are delivered from *The Organic Pantry*. They also have bread delivered to them from the *Leeds Bread Co-op* as well as selling wine to fill your own bottle.

All the shops above offer a wide range of goods from food / teas/ coffees to beauty /household products .

St JOHN'S CHURCHYARD

Many thanks to those who have given large pots for planting, a water butt and the promise of an apple tree - we are just working out where to plant that. We are most grateful for your support. We will get going with the planting and the bug and bee hotel making in the spring with the young people from the Core and the Den.

CLIMATE ACTION PLEDGES

Do please consider making a pledge to take climate action be that prayer, creating less waste or using less plastic or anything else that works for you! The pledge cards are still available at the back of church or you can pledge online on the website (scroll to the bottom of the page).

CHRISTMAS POST BOX

We will be putting out the Christmas Post box shortly. This is for the church community to write one card for all their friends at church rather than lots of individual cards. The cards will be displayed by the Baptistry. Do please support this initiative.

All the above will help us to work towards a silver eco church award but the other "elephant in the room" is getting to net zero. The Church of England has pledged to reach net zero by 2030 for energy use in churches, parish rooms, vicarages and for clergy travel. In 2021, St Johns' scored F on its energy rating where A is best and G is the worst. It should improve now that the roof has been insulated but we have some way to go.

OCTOBER PCC Notes

Colin Alexander, our treasurer, presented a detailed document setting out the *final roof finances*. Despite an increase in the cost due to additional work on the lightning conductor and roof timbers, we are in a sound financial position.

Colin confirmed we would be able to start paying our *Diocesan Share* again towards the end of the year. The PCC thanked Colin for all the work he has done on the roof project.

Fundraising continues with a *Christmas Quiz* planned for Friday 2 December. Sponsor a slate would continue to be available during coffee time until the end of October.

The *lanterns* have been restored and refitted. An electrician has been contacted and is sourcing elements so the lanterns can be rewired. The cost of the lanterns has exceeded the original quote because some of the work had to be subcontracted by the restorer. Colin and Roger are going to explore a compromise payment.

The *Eco Committee* sort permission to plant an apple tree in the Church grounds. The PCC approved this if it was planted away from the wall and the path.

The PCC approved the following *safeguarding documents* for another year: Promoting a safer church, Policy Document, Policy Statement, Appendix 5 Document. The Risk Managements documents for The Den and The Core have also been reviewed.

It was confirmed that the Safeguarding and Insurance Policy are on display in church. Catherine was thanked for all her work ensuring our Safeguarding documents are up to date.

The PCC split into two groups to discuss our *post roof priorities*. This month we focussed on mission. Comments and thoughts were shared on the range of services on offer, the launch of small groups, how the church community keeps in touch and the needs of our village community.

We finished the meeting with prayer.

everyone else, not named in particular but who has dreamt with us and worked hard to make this a reality.

With a secure roof, we can now look ahead to imagine what God has in store for us in the next few years and few decades in Menston. This is something the PCC have begun to think about, working out how best the story of God's love can be shared with our village, how best we can serve our community, how best we can become a family who always strive to care for each other better, and how we can grow in our faith, individually and together.

Please pray for the PCC as they lead us into this next phase of life in St John's.

Thank you for journeying with us through the ups and downs of the roof project, financial and practical. I know it has been difficult at times for various reasons, and I thank God for the church family here who have faced these difficulties with grace. I pray we continue to show each other that grace that comes from God, and extend it even more to our village and our wider world.



A GOOD READ by Dominic Hall

It is that time of year already! Have you got your sprouts on? If the Christmas season does give you a few moments respite from the hurly burly of modern life or if you are looking for a gift for a voracious bookworm, I offer a couple of books that I have enjoyed recently.

First, pack your bags as we are heading to Cyprus. Specifically, 70s civil war torn Cyprus. In 'The Island Of Missing Trees', Elif Shafak has fashioned a lush and heartrending novel of love across the divide. A Christian Greek boy and a Muslim Turkish girl meet and fall in love. This novel is, however, more than a mere retelling of Romeo & Juliet with olives! There are layers of drama, tragedy and ultimately hope that make this a thoroughly rewarding read.

This being a parish magazine it would be remiss not to include a good murder mystery! Louise Candlish is a writer with a knack for channelling middle-class angst into something quite thrilling. Her first book, 'Our House', was adapted into an absorbing TV drama this year. In 'The Heights' she looks at how time has a way of distorting the truth and at what would happen when the person you arrange to kill is still very much alive. Mercifully, not something that happens too often in Menston! The book is ideal for a winter evening and plays on the old theme of 'what would you do' when faced with a terrible moral dilemma and a golden opportunity for revenge.

In 'The Lost Storyteller' Amanda Block draws on themes of family, addiction, alienation and innocence. That makes it sound like quite a heavy read but her ability to draw characters in whom you can believe and who you want to learn more about holds this story together. The perception of a person you have known only as a child juxtaposed with the reality of that person's life is presented here without emotion and with a clarity that cuts through the temptation to bring forth tears. As a result, the story actually draws out greater emotion.

Sometimes truth is stranger than fiction. That is certainly the case in my last recommendation. In 'The Mystery of the Parsee Lawyer' Shrabani Basu explores the case of a young lawyer accused of a senseless crime. In desperation, he appeals to Arthur Conan Doyle to explore the case and help him to prove his innocence. Very quickly we learn about the racism inherent in some English villages in the early twentieth century. With remarkable verve, Basu leads us through a complex case and exposes issues that we all know too well. This excellent book reminds us that we should always be on our guard not to judge people and to challenge intolerance and bigotry when we see it.

I always implore that you forego the massive booksellers in favour of small, independent shops. These are often staffed by people with a deep love of books and their knowledge can recommend new and unusual titles to keep your bookshelves stocked and interesting.







ALL IN THE MONTH OF DECEMBER...

200 years ago, on 27 December 1882 Louis Pasteur, French biologist, microbiologist, and chemist was born. One of the fathers of germ theory, he was best known for the pasteurisation process, which is named in his honour.

100 years ago, on 30 December 1922 the Soviet Union was founded. Officially known as the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics (USSR), it was dissolved in 1991.

90 years ago, on 25 December 1932 the first Royal Christmas Message was broadcast on radio. King George V addressed the nation live from Sandringham.

50 years ago, on 22 December 1972 14 people were found alive in the Andes more than two months after their plane crashed. They had survived by eating dead passengers.

40 years ago, on 12 December 1982 30,000 women joined hands around the Greenham Common RAF base in Berkshire to protest against the siting of US Cruise missiles there.

25 years ago, on 11 December 1997 the Kyoto Protocol, aimed at reducing greenhouse gases and combating global warming, was adopted at a conference in Japan. More than 190 countries have signed the agreement, which came into effect in February 2005.
