

The Vicarage

Dear Friends

The importance of good theology was recently brought home to me in a new way. Without going into details, someone came to talk to me about heaven and what it would be like as they could not bear to imagine heaven without the ability to recognise and be with someone else. They're not the only person to ask about it — a bunch of questions were put in our question box about similar issues. But it brought home to me that theology isn't just about theory, but instead it's of vital importance for the very deepest things we think about and worry about.

This is why the question box at the back of church is so important and why I spend time trying to respond to things in it.

Good theology makes such a difference to the way we live now, to how we view our Christian hope, to how we see fundamental things like 'sin', for example, that has become so difficult to translate nowadays, Perhaps most of all, theology makes a difference to how we see God.

Because our faith isn't about rules and propositions, but is instead about a living relationship with God himself, we explore that relationship. Finding out about someone from a distance is certainly not a substitute for meeting someone, but sitting by a fireside and listening to someone's stories, their dreams and the way they see the world is a way we all grow in relationship with others.

Reading our Bible, and thinking about the writings within it, is a great way of knowing God better and listening in at

God's fireside. When we pray, we aren't praying to a stranger, therefore, but are settling down to that fireside, sharing our lives and listening to God in return.

All this is theology: The stuff that stops us living in fear of not being good enough because we learn to trust in Jesus for our salvation. The stuff that helps us as we ask the question, who am I, even as we feel our faculties begin to slip from our grasp. The stuff that responds to the overwhelming sense of awe that something essential has happened as we celebrate the birth of a new life. The stuff that relates our own hopes and dreams for the future to our sense of calling from God in a world where we owe everything to our creator. All this is theology. And good theology – prayerful reflection upon God described for us in our Bibles – is as necessary now as it's ever been.

So, ask your questions about faith, explore in discussion with others, spend time with God, read your Bibles, exercise gratitude for all that God has given you. And in doing so, don't just learn about God, but spend time with God at his fireside swapping tales, hopes and dreams together as you learn to trust God more.

A View from The Pews by Dominic Hall

This May sees two extraordinary events that in many ways illustrate who we are as a people, a nation and as members of a global community. If you read on you will see how I attempt to link the Coronation of King Charles III with the Eurovision Song Contest!

Let's get the prosaic out of the way first. Liverpool plays host to the Eurovision this year as Ukraine is unable to do so in light of the continuing conflict in that country. It is wonderful that the global community has pulled together to ensure that an event that brings joy to millions is not ruined by the callous acts of violence perpetrated by Putin's forces. I remember well the immense and raucous support shown to the Bosnian entries of the mid-1990s as brutality and violence laid waste to that land. Whatever one thinks of the Eurovision Song Contest, it remains an extraordinary example of international togetherness and shared experience.

Togetherness is also at the heart of the Coronation. The death of Her late Majesty and the succession of King Charles has led to a reigniting of the debate about the purpose of monarchy and the scale on which it is seen in the UK. Some will say now is the time to update the institution or even


abolish the idea of a hereditary head of state. Others argue that a monarch provides identity and an apolitical focal point for the nation. Both arguments have merit, but it is unlikely that one will trump the other and we will remain in a status quo.

The coronation provides a similar opportunity to the four jubilees of Queen Elizabeth II. It gives people a chance to show off who we are as a nation and how we can be confident that, to quote the late Jo Cox MP 'we have more in common than that which divides us.'

The religious and sacred elements of the ceremony place faith as an integral part of our national identity. The King has suggested in the past that he would wish to be seen as 'defender of faiths' in a nod to the diverse and inclusive society for which so many strive.

It is in our diversity as a people and inclusivity of others that we can have real strength. The Eurovision highlights the latter and the Coronation embeds the former. May 2023 could well be the month in which we begin to forget the divisions of the past few years and sow seeds that will forge a stronger United Kingdom in confident symbiosis with Europe for years to come.

Eco Church Group

We have had a busy few weeks! The Eco quiz held in March brought out some competitive tendencies with five teams showing off their skills in identifying flowers, bird calls and climate themes in musicals! Using duplo bricks to explore the carbon footprint of households in Menston proved an interesting challenge - Menston comes



in at 21 tonnes of CO2, higher than the GB average of 16, Bradford 15! Not a great accolade. To reduce the carbon footprint of the evening, the participants enjoyed a veggie meal plus cake with plenty of food for thought!

For those who want to know, the carbon footprint breaks down as follows:

Goods/services 7.8 Housing = 4.9Food = 4.7 Travel = 4.1 Waste = less than 1.

In April, 11 of us visited the Recycling and Energy Recovery Centre in East Leeds where domestic rubbish (black bins) is incinerated to produce electricity for the grid and the hot water by product is used to heat homes - the Leeds PIPES scheme. We all dressed up in high vis/goggles/gloves etc and peered into the furnace which burns the rubbish at 850 degrees. The furnace is monitored 24/7 as are the emissions from the chimney which are very limited. The ash produced from the furnace is used for road building. It was really interesting and the iconic building has a green wall on its south side with over 111,000 plants and is home to kestrels!

On Easter Saturday, an all age event was held in the churchyard to kickstart our community vegetable growing project with the children sowing carrot, beetroot, spring onions, lettuce seeds and potatoes in pots kindly donated by members of the congregation. We have set up a watering rota and are hoping for great things. An Easter Garden was also created plus bee/bug hotels for the churchyard.

We are planning a tree trail for the churchyard and hope to get more people involved in our green initiatives over the next few months.

St JOHN'S MISSION GIVING IN 2023 Local Charity ~ Wheatfields Hospice

Wheatfields Hospice is based in Headingley, Leeds. It provides specialist care for people across Leeds who are terminally ill (also helping their friends and families.)

The expert team at Wheatfields includes doctors, specialist Sue Ryder nurses, nursing assistants, physiotherapists, occupational and complementary therapists and a family support team. They are dedicated to providing specialist medical care for managing pain and other symptoms with additional emotional, practical and spiritual support.

A personalised care plan is prepared for each patient, combining their wishes with the advice of the experts in order to meet their needs. The aim is to help the patients to live the best life they can whilst coping with terminal illness.

The care is provided either in the hospice itself or patients can be cared for in their own homes, for as long as possible, helping them to manage their medication and providing emotional support to them and their carers.

The hospice also provides a bereavement support group which meets once a month, providing a listening ear for any of their patients or family members who need someone to talk to. This helps them to deal with situations or feelings that can be hard to cope with alone eg. worries about the future, grief and loss. There is also the New Horizons Cafe which provides support to families with children, dealing with the loss of partners and the daily struggle of becoming a single parent.

Wheatfields is a charity and all this care is free. However, it costs £3.8m per year to provide it - equating to £10,500 per day. It is dependent on charitable giving, legacies and the tireless fundraising of their supporters. Our gift helps in a very small way towards this.

Did you know 10 Facts about King Charles III?

- 1. He was born at 9.14pm on 14 November 1948, to Princess Elizabeth and Prince Philip, at Buckingham Palace in London.
- 2. He has been heir-apparent to the throne since the age of three.
- 3. He is the first monarch in British history to have earned a university degree. From 1967 to 1970 he studied history at Cambridge University.
- 4. He can speak Welsh. He spent two months learning the language in 1969, as he prepared to become the Prince of Wales. He still speaks it today.
- 5. He is a qualified pilot and diver. While serving in the military in the 1970s, he trained as a jet and helicopter pilot and became a confident diver.
- 6. He is a keen watercolour painter, a published author, and a music lover, who played the cello at Cambridge. He has done some TV: making a guest appearance on Coronation Street, and presenting the BBC weather forecast.
- 7. As Prince of Wales, he founded nearly 20 charities. Together, they raise £140 million each year for good causes. He is passionate about the environment, speaking out against plastic pollution as early as 1970. He has planted many trees during royal engagements.
- 8. Aged 73, King Charles III is the oldest monarch ever to be crowned in British history. He became King on 8 September 2022, after the death of his mother, the Queen, in Balmoral.
- 9. As head of the Commonwealth, King Charles III is monarch of each of the 14 Commonwealth realms: Antigua & Barbuda, Australia, Bahamas, Belize, Canada, Grenada, Jamaica, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea, Saint Kitts & Nevis, Saint Lucia, Saint Vincent & the Grenadines, the Solomon Islands, and Tuvalu. As King, he's also the only person in the UK who can travel abroad in the Commonwealth without a passport and drive without a licence.
- 10. King Charles III has two children, Princes William and Harry, and five grandchildren. Prince William is next in line to become King and was named the Prince of Wales in 2022.



Bishop of Durham responds to immigration proposals

The Bishop of Durham, Paul Butler, Church of England spokesman on refugees, has recently issued the following response to the Home Secretary's statement on the Illegal Migration Bill

He said: 'No one wants to see people risking their lives to reach safety, but we must ask is this Bill the right response - one that is built on compassion, justice and moral leadership?

'It's likely to push thousands of people, including children, into a prolonged legal limbo and imprisonment, and does nothing to support timely and effective consideration of asylum requests.

'It would label all those crossing the Channel illegal entrants and therefore people to whom we do not owe a responsibility and would criminalise the act of claiming asylum - without acknowledging that many are highly vulnerable people escaping persecution and war, who have been left with no safe routes.

'The Home Secretary acknowledges the growing global refugee crisis, which we can't solve on our own, but it is disappointing that the Government has decided to not take on a greater role in leading the world to equitably support those forced to flee their home.

'We must not abdicate our legal and moral responsibility to some of the world's most vulnerable by simply treating asylum seekers as a group not to be welcomed or integrated, but detained and returned. We must do and be better. '

PCC Notes

PCC met via zoom on 27 March.

Iain and Colin presented the figures for the churches income and outgoings so far this year. We continue to deal with the financial challenges posed by cost of living issues and post Covid recovery. Colin has informed the diocese that it is unlikely that we will be able to pay the full parish share this year, but regular monthly payments are being paid at a slightly reduced rate.

A new eco-tank printer has been purchased for the office at a cost of £250 to replace the printer which broke.

Andrew is still looking for volunteers to form a group to coordinate fundraising events over the coming year.

Some fundraising is taking place, the recent Eco Quiz Social raised £80. The Fairfax singers will present a Coronation Concert in May and tickets are on sale now.

The lantern holder above the entrance to the church porch is being repaired and will be reinstated as soon as possible. The gates at the bottom of the sloping pathway to church are in a poor state. Hilary is arranging for the gates to be removed.

Marilyn confirmed that she has the role of Parish Environmental Officer. The Eco group have an event planned on Easter Saturday which will include planting vegetables in the pots at the side of the Parish Room.

Marilyn advised that the Deanery Synod had met and discussed the Barnabas Project. This is a new initiative to encourage churches to work together, share ideas and resources and support the development of leadership. The three yearly elections for Deanery Synod are coming up this year. Anyone interested in standing for election is welcome to talk to Marilyn or Sally who are the churches current reps to find out what is involved.

The PCC split into groups to discuss our post roof priorities. This month we focussed on Worship. Comments and thoughts were shared on the wide range of services and worship styles we have on offer. Ideas were offered on ways to communicate the work that goes on in church across each service and group to the whole church family.

We finished the meeting with prayer.

More Flowers with Biblical Connections

CEDAR OF LEBANON - cedrus Libani

This tree is mentioned several times in the old testament, and I first heard of it when visiting Salisbury Cathedral many years ago. We saw two enormous specimens in the Cloister Courtyard which were planted in 1837 to mark Queen Victoria's accession to the throne. They are still there and can grow up to 100 metres tall.



OLIVE - olea Europaea

We are all familiar with the many uses of olive oil and the references to the Mount of Olives in the Bible. For centuries new monarchs have been anointed during their coronation. The oil always used is called chrism oil or myrrh. It is created using olives from the Mount of Olives and the oil is scented with a sweet perfume. It is consecrated in the Church of the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem before being brought to London for 6 May. According to 1 Kings 1:39 Solomon was anointed by Zadok the priest and Nathan the prophet as Handel reminds us in his Coronation Anthem Zadok the Priest.



When Jesus spoke in parables he used plants which grow in the Middle East and so were familiar to the people. Examples are

The *Grape Vine - vitis vinifera* and the *Mustard - brassica juncea*.
