## The Vicarage

## **Dear Friends**

I've been really enjoying reading the book of Judges in the Old Testament section of the Bible recently. For those of you who have never read it, you should have a look – it's just the right blend of moral lessons, theology and Horrible Histories! The series of flawed characters provides both hope and warning for us: hope that God can use us even though we are imperfect; warning that it's easy to get carried away with our own importance.

In particular, the story of Gideon charts the course of a man who saves the Israelites from the armies of Midian. It starts with Gideon questioning why God has allowed his people to be oppressed, before daringly, and under the cover of darkness, he tears down all the artefacts of worship to the other gods of the day. This lands him in big trouble from which he is saved by his father. Gideon raises an army to repel the Midianites, but only after famously checking and re-checking with God. His large army is whittled down to only 300 men who experience God's deliverance from the oppressing enemy. He then takes some revenge on allies who didn't help him, gets vengeance for the lives of his slain family (whilst trying to make his son take the revenge instead of him), and becomes the ruler of the Israelites. Then he creates a golden ephod that ironically people start to worship instead of God.

There is so much good in the story. Yet at the end, the same man who tore down idols, creates one. The same man who sought to defend his people from oppression, becomes a man of bloody vengeance. The same man who sought

His lasting legacy becomes a bloodthirsty massacre of his own family and a country that turns away from God as soon as he is gone. It's a sad tale.

Why am I telling you it, you may ask? Partly, it's to encourage you to read your Bible and discover its treasure for yourself. But also it's because there's so many little parallels that exploring these stories raise for our own faith and understanding of God – like the times where we wrestle between trust and doubt, when we pray in times of trouble but forget when things are going well, and when we easily make other things our idols, even if they are the very things that can remind us of a Godly past.

At Eastertime, it is easy to forget, amidst the cross and resurrection of Jesus, that we are flawed characters too. It is the same tendency to forget God, worship the wrong things, take revenge when we are slighted, that mean that we are among those who need the forgiveness that Easter brings and the salvation that God provides. Thankfully, like with Gideon in the book of Judges, God saves his people even when we don't deserve it.

## A View from The Pews by Dominic Hall

In my class last week two of my learners had a fight. This is, perhaps surprisingly for a prison, a mercifully rare occurrence. The following day, when the dust had settled, I asked one of them what the fight was about. He was in tears as he told me the other chap had insulted his family – a family he has not seen in four years and a father who is currently receiving end of life care.

I don't tell this story to create a sense of 'poor him'. Being in prison is a consequence of the actions he has taken. I tell the story mainly to highlight a couple of very human traits. We are, at times, bewilderingly cruel. There is never a justification for speaking ill of another's family or personal life. We do not know, cannot know, the lives of others or the way they experience them, and compassion and empathy are important tools in our locker.

We can also be terribly vulnerable. The young man I spoke with might appear to strangers as a tough and cocky type. When talking about his family and the lack of contact he immediately became a scared little boy who just wants a hug from his mum.

The incident got me thinking about the need for all of us to pursue a path of understanding. In Harper Lee's 'To Kill A Mockingbird' Atticus reminds his children that you can't judge others "until you put on their skin and walk around for a while." It's good advice and perhaps needed now more than ever.

You might recall in mid-February the terrifying scenes outside an hotel in Liverpool that was housing asylum seekers. A baying mob had a run-in with the police, vehicles were set alight and people were hurt. Mercifully, those inside the hotel were physically unharmed, though I shudder to think how terrified they must have been. If only there were loud, compassionate voices encouraging people not to judge but to listen; not to hit but to hug; not to hate but to love.

What makes someone pay large sums of money to a person they have never met, get in a flimsy boat and make the perilous trip across the Channel eludes me. That they would leave their family not knowing when or even if they will see them again is something I find astoundingly brave. I doubt I could do it. I think that it shows the best of us when we meet them not with hard faces and harsh words but with understanding and kindness and maybe a blanket and a hot drink. Calling all Crafters!

The painters, even the greatest, don't show how, in the midnight Garden, or staggering uphill under the weight of the Cross, *He went through with even the human longing* to simply cease, to not be. *Not torture of body,* not the hideous betravals humans commit nor the faithless weakness of friends, and surely not the anticipation of death (not then, in agony's grip) was Incarnation's heaviest weight, but this sickened desire to renege, to step back from what He, Who was God, had promised Himself, and had entered time and flesh to enact. Sublime acceptance, to be absolute, had to have welled up from those depths where purpose Drifted for mortal moments.

## **Revision of the Electoral Roll 2023**

## The Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) will be held on Sunday 30 April.

When you are on the Electoral Roll, you can:

- vote at the meeting to elect PCC members and Deanery representatives:
- you can also raise matters of parochial or general church interest, and
- you can stand for election yourself. •

Being on the Roll, enables us to take a full part in the decisionmaking process of the Church of England which allows the laity to express views on matters that affect us all. Everyone over 16 years, who is baptised and has been a regular 'attender' at services during the past 6 months is eligible to go on the Roll. If you attend St John's regularly and are not on the Roll, please do consider completing an application form.

The revision of the Roll is a rather drawn out process, but it is a legal requirement. The existing Roll will be placed on view at the back of church on Sundays 19, 26 March and Sunday 2 April. Application forms will be in the same red folder. Completed forms should be handed to me, or handed in to the Parish Office in an envelope marked with my name by Sunday 2 April at the latest.

The revised Roll then will be on view for 3 Sundays – from 9 April. If you have moved during the last year, please check with me that I have your correct address. No new names can be added to the Roll during this interim period i.e. until after the APCM.

At our last meeting on 7 March we were pleased to welcome MU Speaker Mrs Alison Boggie from Baildon who led members in a very peaceful and thought-provoking Lent Meditation, very appropriate for any difficult times which some people may be currently undergoing. Alison is well-known to us, having visited us many times in the past, and it was good to see her again and exchange news about our respective lives and families.

Our recent MU Leeds Diocesan Newsletter, which is distributed to all branches, highlighted a new project - the Mothers' Union Warm Hands Appeal, which keen knitters may like to become involved with, perhaps in time for next winter.

A certain member has been knitting mittens for her local primary school children for several years, as she had found many turned up at school with cold hands and had to wait until their hands warmed up before they could start writing. She is appealing for others to support this project (ready-made gloves or mittens could also be donated) but of course the local school would need to be contacted first to ask if they would appreciate receiving the donations.

MU members were also encouraged to use the following Praver for the earthquake in Turkey and Syria:-

We pray for the people of Central Turkey and North West Syria, whose lives have been devastated by the earthquake. Be present, O Lord, our Good Shepherd, to bring comfort, relief, shelter and human kindness. Shield the people who suffer, console those who are bereaved, prosper the provision of relief, strengthen the work of the emergency teams, and shine your light and hope in the midst of despair. We pray this in the name of Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen

#### PCC NOTES

During winter PCC meetings are held on zoom. 14 members were present and we began with prayer in small groups thinking about our joys and challenges.

The PCC is responsible for the oversight of all the church's life. Like many churches, the financial position is still recovering from the Covid lockdowns and the cost-ofliving crisis. We pray that there will be a general recovery and our accounts will remain on trend. This will become clearer over the next six months.

**Fundraising** will be vital if we are to do some of the things that we know need doing. It is a relief to have the roof project finalised but there are still many things which need attention. Having at last secured the refurbishment of our smart lanterns on the main gate posts, the lantern over the front door was found to be unsafe and has gone for repair.

**Social activities.** We hope to recruit people on an ad-hoc basis to help with social activities – see p9. There will be a Coronation Concert on Friday 5 May by the Fairfax Singers (p21), and possibly other Coronation activities including an outside service on the stage as was done for the Jubilee. Peter Wilbraham has volunteered to host a Summer Quiz evening, which is always very popular. Promoting the Cake and Craft stall each month seems to be improving the turnover, but we are always in need of both stock to sell and customers to purchase.

**Our Eco group** have been busy. The PCC were particularly pleased to hear how our children and voung people are engaged with this work. An apple tree has now been planted in the churchvard. A Family Event is to be held on Easter Saturday – volunteers needed. If anyone has any spare pots, please leave them by the Parish Room - they are needed for our planting of vegetables project. The building of Bug Hotels is also on the list. There is to be a visit to the Leeds Recycling centre on 4 April 2023 (no under 16's may attend because of Health and Safety) to find out what happens to all our rubbish see p17.

We are planning to create a **notice board** so that people know who is who. Photographs of PCC members are still needed. The Big Screen in church now has additional slides to promote our Charitable Giving and a QR code is available on screen and in the Parish Notes for those who use mobile phones.

As a PCC we continue to think about ways to communicate to both our Church Family and the wider community. If you have any ideas or questions, then do please put them in the Big Question Box at the back of church.

## **Flowers with Christian connections**

There are many plants whose names reflects something of Christianity. Plants with faith links include:

- **Pasque Flower** Pulsatilla vulgaris thought to be the lilies of the field Jesus pointed to in his Sermon on the Mount.
- **Solomon's Seal** Polygonatum multiflorum grows in the wild now only in a few places but in many gardens. King Solomon was renowned for his wisdom, composed 3,000 proverbs and 1,005 songs and built the first temple.
- **Speedwell Veronica**. When Jesus carried his cross, legend has it that Veronica was the woman in the crowd who offered him her handkerchief. When Jesus handed it back his face was imprinted on the cloth. An old country name for speedwell is 'God's Eye'.


## 2025 Menston Heritage Group


