

Dear Friends

It is an ancient saying in the UK that March ‘comes in like a lion and goes out like a lamb’. Scholars have dated this proverb back to at least 1732, where it appeared written in an almanack of ‘wise and witty sayings’. Whatever its origin it is fair to say that the first three months of this year have seen us battered by many different storms and winds. This year also we are a good way through Lent, which is our annual opportunity to deepen our sense of God and put things right in our hearts. By taking advantage of this fasting time which began way back on Ash Wednesday, we are in a good place to celebrate the Joy that Easter brings.

This idea of Challenge followed by Hope, Death followed by Life, Pain followed by Joy, does feel to be a recurrent theme. I guess it links in with the rather mawkish Victorian promise of ‘pie in the sky when you die’. Things can only get better. The danger of all of this of course is that we neglect the here and now. Constantly hoping for something different, or better, means that we either put our lives on hold until tomorrow comes, or we ignore all that we have been given, trusting that one day we will be given more. In Matthew’s gospel we read that Jesus told his disciples, ‘Give your entire attention to what God is doing right now, and don’t get worked up about what might or might not happen tomorrow. God will help you deal with whatever comes up, when it happens’. In other words, Jesus was advocating that we live for today and get as much Joy out of it as we can.

An interregnum can feel a little bit like ‘life on hold’, its easy to think ‘well it doesn’t really matter until we’ve got a new priest’. If that is where you are at, can I gently persuade you to look around, to see what is going on, who is doing what.

During a vacancy we never ‘Shut up the Shop’, there is a whole team of people continuing to do all that they did, and all that they can, as we continue to be a living, serving, loving Church, here in Menston. You are part of that community right now, and you have a place, a role, maybe even a vocation.

As well as being a time of waiting and preparation, Lent gives us an active time to do all kinds of things - spiritual spring cleaning, study and reading, praying, and serving. Looking forward is important obviously, but not at the cost of missing the now stuff. So if you are starting to rest on your laurels, don’t miss out on what God is doing here, today, for you, and if you are one of those who are still loyally serving and keeping the show on the road, God bless you, and a heart felt thank you for all the ways that you live out your discipleship.

As I am writing this, I am days away from my much anticipated surgery. I can’t thank people enough for their care and concern, and for their love and practical help. I can’t help thinking about what tomorrow will look like. So, as ever, I take a very large dose of my own medicine, and see all around promises of God’s goodness and activity, not in the future but in the now.

God bless all your activities and busy-ness this Lent, and know that God will deal with whatever might happen...when it comes!

A View from The Pews by Dominic Hall

We are now in the middle of Lent, one of the seasons where we are asked to reflect on our Christianity and indeed our humanity.

We try during this period to, in the smallest of ways, emulate Jesus in the wilderness – rejecting temptation and overcoming the Devil.

In Lent we are also encouraged to think about our place in the world and how we treat the people with whom we come into contact. What impact we have on the lives of others says much about who we are and how we live a Christian life.

I have recently finished reading ‘Love From The Pink Palace’ by Jill Nalder. Jill was a star of the West End stage in the early 1990s. At this time, many of her friends and colleagues fell victim to the AIDS epidemic. She could have sat by and watched, attending friends’ funerals, feeling sorry for her loss and the pain of others. However, Jill did not do this. Instead, she decided she would join the fight – for dignity, for justice, for hope. She organised charity concerts and revues collecting money to be used to cover the cost of treatment and care. She advocated for those who had no voice. She visited and comforted the lonely, the sick, the dying and the bereaved. She did all this in and amongst the auditions, training, rehearsals and performance that were her day job.


Jill is an example of a core Christian message – use the talents you have been given to make a difference in the world. Be a force for change and a force for good.

To paraphrase President John F Kennedy, ‘Ask not what others can do for you; ask what you can do for others.’

It is a sentiment and a message that should bind us as Christians and as humans. In Lent, we would do well to ask how giving up chocolate, sweets, cakes or alcohol for six weeks, beneficial as that may be for ourselves, projects that Christian message? Making these ‘sacrifices’ is well and good but looking out for others, taking on helpful tasks or making small, manageable and sustainable changes better reflects the way in which we can help ease suffering and hardship in the world.

This should, of course, be more than a Lenten task and should shape the way we behave the whole year round. Lent is a good place to reflect on what we can do and is an excellent starting point for making those changes and determining how to be better Christians every day.

With huge help from Maurice, because the children were very young, I went on a residential course at Addington Palace, outside London, the headquarters of The Royal School of Church Music, and learnt much about Choral Evensong.

When I officially became organist and choirmaster I took the choir boys, and later girls, to Bradford Cathedral to be examined for their ribbons.

As a reward, when they passed the exam we stopped at Harry Ramsdens on the way home for fish and chips! They are obviously adults now with families of their own but I hope they will always remember the love of traditional Church Music. It is the voice of all joy and sorrow, it needs no translation.

It was always a huge privilege to play the organ and worship God through my gift of music.

Revision of the Electoral Roll 2024

The Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) will be held on *Sunday 28 April*.

This year's APCM will be held on Sunday 28 April and the Electoral Roll must be updated – or, revised, before then. This is the final 'revision' before a new Roll is drawn up next year, so I am fairly sure nearly everyone is now on the Roll.

However, if you have joined our church family recently, do consider going onto the Roll. It means you can vote at the meeting to elect PCC members and Deanery representatives; you can also raise matters of parochial or general Church interest, and you can stand for election. You can also become a sidesperson. To be on the Roll, you must be baptised and 16 years old, either live in the parish, or have worshipped here regularly for at least 6 months.

The Roll will be on view at the back of church on 24 & 31 March and 7 April and during that time application forms will be available in the back of the folder. Completed forms should be returned to me, or left in the office in an envelope marked with my name, by **7 April** at the latest. After that date, no names can be added until after the APCM.





PCC Notes

PCC met on 29 January, sitting as the **SECTION 11** meeting in the process of filling our vacancy for a new priest.

To be able to complete our Parish Profile we needed to make several timely decisions:

- Firstly, our continued intention to give 5% of our annual income to our Mission Giving. This is good gospel practice. As well as asking for resources we also give as much as we can. This is decided, locally, nationally, and internationally, by the congregation voting with buttons. This year we will give a total of £5,396.45 to our three nominated charities. Thank you for helping us continue to do this.
- We also agreed to give what we promised we would to the Parish Share, which this year amounts to £70,000. Again, this is through the generosity of our givers, and with rising costs we know how this is a challenge for everyone and that future years will continue to be a challenge. We trust and pray that our generosity will be enabled to continue.

- The second issue we had to discuss, for both our profile and our search for a new priest, was around the debate that has dominated the newspapers regarding General Synod's support for better inclusion, and the place of LGBT people in the life of our church. After careful discussion we produced this statement:

As a church we are on a journey towards being 'Inclusive' in full. This means becoming open and accepting of the guidance issued recently around Living in Love and Faith and the use of the Prayers of Blessing. We hope that the new priest will accompany us as we explore what this means for us in terms of mission and ministry.

If you want to know more about the background to this statement and understand more about what the PCC have said, please ask one of the wardens or Andrew.

In the **SECTION 11 meeting, as required for a Church seeking a new priest**, we thanked Roger and Catherine

for the work they had done on the profile and the brochure which will help potential candidates to understand a little bit more about the post here at St Johns. If you are interested in seeing the brochure it will be published on our website.

The next step, **SECTION 12**, is on the 29 February. This is when the PCC meet with Bishop Toby, the Archdeacon, the area Dean, and the Lay Chair of the Deanery, to agree the recruitment process and launch our search for a new priest.

We also agreed that the elected 2 parish representatives to sit on the selection panel should be David and Hilary, our lead wardens.

Please keep all of this in your prayers Thank you.

- When you need to buy a large item, research it carefully. Think about how long it could last, how much it costs to run, what it is made of, where it is made, can it be recycled at the end of its life. Better quality items often last longer and so cost you less over time.
