The Vicarage

Dear Friends

In our evening service at 6pm we are working through the story of Joseph. We all think we know Joseph, especially his 'Technicolour Dreamcoat' which was red and yellow and... but what we're finding on Sunday evenings is that the story is much more complex and has much more to tell us than the musical suggests.

Joseph is a story of faithful service despite disappointment, anger and frustration. It's the story an arrogant youth maturing into a much wiser man whilst at the same time negotiating meteoric rises and falls in fortune. It's the story of God working in the background, despite a plethora of flawed characters and dishonest plans, to save his world from famine. It's also the story of a dream that sets in motion the events that ironically bring about its realisation. In Joseph's story there is much for us to ponder that relate to our own lives and experiences.

With Joseph, though, it's not a case of 'Any dream will do.' Dreams are important throughout the story and their interpretation is the key to Joseph's succession. I read a book recently that argued that we tend to forget that we live in 'time.' The author talked about how, given that we are time-based people, we need to practice the art of 'discernment.' Much like Joseph's interpretation of the dreams of the baker, the cupholder and Pharaoh himself, we are to discern God's will and God's message for *now*.

Now don't get me wrong. I'm not saying that God's selfdisclosure in the Bible and through Jesus himself isn't in some ways changeless. But what I am supposing is that each day we wake up, we discern what it is that we need to do as God's people in God's world today; just like Joseph had to discern what it meant to work in Potiphar's household, the prison, and then Pharaoh's household. Following God faithfully would have looked quite different in each circumstance, and certainly dealing with the emotional baggage of being chucked in a well, sold into slavery, falsely accused and thrown into prison would have added spice to that discernment.

We are people who live in history; who have a past that we drag with us into the present. We practice discernment in the present based on that past, our current circumstances and our future hopes. For us, as followers of Jesus, this discernment, like Joseph's, isn't the same as other peoples'. Instead, we discern God's voice for us as we read our Bibles and pray. We discern as we meet together to worship and to encourage each other in faith. We discern as we listen for that inner prompting from God throughout our days. And we discern as we seek to live faithfully in whatever circumstances we are given for today – who knows, perhaps, like Joseph, God is working through us and we just can't see it yet.

If you want to try the book I read, it is James, K.A. Smith, *How To Inhabit Time*.

Revision of the Electoral Roll 2023

The Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) will be held on *Sunday 30 April*.

When you are on the Electoral Roll, you can:

- vote at the meeting to elect PCC members and Deanery representatives;
- you can also raise matters of parochial or general church interest, and
- · you can stand for election yourself.

Being on the Roll, enables us to take a full part in the decision-making process of the Church of England which allows the laity to express views on matters that affect us all. Everyone over 16 years, who is baptised and has been a regular 'attender' at services during the past 6 months is eligible to go on the Roll. If you attend St John's regularly and are not on the Roll, please do consider completing an application form.


The revision of the Roll is a rather drawn out process, but it is a legal requirement. The existing Roll will be placed on view at the back of church on **Sundays 19, 26 March and Sunday 2 April**. Application forms will be in the same red folder. Completed forms should be handed to me, or handed in to the Parish Office in an envelope marked with my name by **Sunday 2** *April* at the latest.

The revised Roll then will be on view for 3 Sundays – from 9 April. If you have moved during the last year, please check with me that I have your correct address. No new names can be added to the Roll during this interim period i.e. until after the APCM.

A View from The Pews by Dominic Hall

Is the Church of England a body based in the principles of equality? At the recent general synod everybody seemed vexed over the treatment of committed gay couples wishing to be married in their faith. The decision, to continue to deny marriage equality will be seen either as a slamming of the door once again or a reaffirmation of principle. Similarly the decision to allow vicars to offer prayers and blessings to couples from the LGBTQ+ community might be seen as a chink of light for the future or an intolerable liberalisation and 'woke' rendering of scripture.

The stated objective of the Archbishop of Canterbury in this discussion is to try to keep the global Anglican community together. I wonder whether that is an impossible task. Further, I wonder whether the aim is even desirable.

In the UK there are representatives of all faiths and none at the heart of our society. Indeed, the current Prime Minister is a member of the Hindu faith. In spite of this huge diversity in belief and opinion, we remain a largely peaceful and tolerant society. Perhaps it is time for the leadership in Anglicanism to take a similar arrangement within our faith community. It would be easy to say that the cultural differences throughout the communion are causing the bind for Welby. However, if other societies are allowed to have their views imposed on those of us here then the relationship does not appear to be equal, respectful and tolerant.

Marriage between couples of the same sex became the law of the land in 2013 and yet in the decade since the church has barely got on to the slip road. The brake on progress appears to be conservative voices across the communion and Welby's attempts to keep the communion in one place.

It is only my view, of course, but it seems now is the time to flip the debate and ask those conservative voices to explain with clarity how denying love is part of the teachings of Christ. More importantly, I think it is also time to ask the uneasy questions of the Church leaders in this country. Is keeping the communion together globally really more important than the well-being of those members of the communion here at home?

A church is its people. We are at our best when we encourage others to live their lives to the fullest. However, sometimes it is better for us to be living apart in mutual acceptance than clinging on to a marriage that isn't working and that is tearing each other apart.

Comment from Steve, (Vicar) - This is a complex issue with domestic disagreement as well as the international concerns Dominic highlights in his article. Andrew, our Associate Priest, and I are looking at ways of facilitating and informing discussion going forward, following the vote at Synod. If you are keen to know more, or be part of this, please let me know. Thanks.

St JOHN'S MISSION GIVING IN 2023

International Charity

Médecins Sans Frontières (MSF) / Doctors without Borders

MSF are currently working in Iraq, South Sudan, Haiti, Somaliland, Nigeria, Mozambique and Ukraine.

In Ukraine, MSF is operating a medical train evacuating patients from near the frontiers of fighting to safer areas. It is similar in set-up to a hospital, complete with an intensive care unit. They see many types of patients on the train: elderly people with chronic diseases trapped by the conflict; children with multiple trauma wounds, patients with blast injuries, bone fractures, amputations.

Artur Struminskyy is a nurse aide working on the train and writes of one harrowing encounter with a 15 year-old girl with extensive damage to her abdominal area and spinal chord - the result of a bomb blast. 'Despite everything she had been through, she kept a positive attitude and smiled at the medical staff whenever we passed her bed or checked on her. She showed what resilience can look like when you've been seriously injured. Meeting somebody like her is incredibly motivating - it inspires you to do all you can for the patients in your care.'

Working on MSF's medical train has made me appreciate the peace that I took for granted before the war. This experience has taught me that war can happen anywhere and anyone of us could be the next person who needs help.'

MSF produce regular publicity about their work. See back of the church for some recent items and the excellent website www.msg.org.uk

They are proud of how they spend our contributions. 86% goes to their humanitarian work 12% on fundraising. For every £1 they spend they rise £6.60. 2% on office management.

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PCC Notes

The PCC met via zoom on Monday 23 January. We began by praying for leaders both in the Church of England, and in the world. There are many challenges in the world and so we prayed in small groups.

The Council then received the Annual Financial Report from Colin. There was good news in that the roof project has been completed and paid for, but there are real challenges for the future as, like the world around us, costs are spiralling and no fund raising was done foe church general funds was done in 2022. Covid stopped lots of external users of the Parish Rooms and weddings and funerals were down again due to lockdown rules. These things take time to financially recover from. In presenting the budget for next year, the PCC were told we need to look at fund raising to assist in breaking even next year. Social and fund raising ideas are needed as are volunteers to help with this year's plans.

We were pleased to hear that the gatepost lantern work was now completed and thanks to a donation the electrical work is also completed so they are shining bright again.

Plans are a foot for the Coronation Celebrations, and we were delighted to hear that the Fairfax Singers are willing to present a concert for us on Friday 5 May to begin our weekend of Celebrations. More details of other events will come nearer the time.

The Eco-group are working hard with plans for pots and planters, bee and bug hotels, nature trails around the churchyard and an eco-quiz for families in March.

Conversations were held about how well we communicate together and how we relate to the Menston village. Lots of ideas for improving our communications - look out for innovations coming up. One of the ideas was to create a display about who the officers are and who is on the PCC.

There will be elections again at the APCM so why not start thinking whether you could serve on the PCC?



What happened to your last mobile phone?

What did you do with your last, old mobile phone, after you bought the new one? Apparently 52% of us hoard it away somewhere, just in case. A recent survey estimates that there are now 90 million old mobile phones in our homes, lurking in drawers or under beds, or handed on to other members of the family.



The average life of a mobile phone is seven years, but 87% of us will have gone through three or four phones by then. It is vital to recycle phones and do your bit for the environment. It won't cost you anything. Some ideas of what to do with an old phone:

- Upgrading? The shop where you're buying should recycle your old phone for you free of charge. They will make sure your hand set is recycled properly.
- Many local authority waste and recycling sites have a special bin where you deposit phones for recycling.
- Check your user guide you might find that replacing the battery, updating software or freeing up memory gets you extra time with your phone.
- Faulty screens, dusty connections or loose components can be fixed and you could save yourself money.
- Many charities welcome mobile phones, which they can resell or give to people who need them.
- There's a huge market in second-hand mobile phones. Try
 Ebay or Gumtree or comparison sites such as <u>Compare and</u>
 <u>Recycle</u>.














All in the month of MARCH

300 years ago, on 8 March 1723 Sir Christopher Wren, English architect, died. Best known for designing St Paul's Cathedral.

80 years ago, on 13 March 1943 the final liquidation of Krakow Ghetto in Poland took place. 8,000 Jews were transported to Plaszow labour camp, 2,000 more were simply killed in the streets, and the rest were sent to Auschwitz.

20 years ago, on 12 March 2003 that the World Health Organisation issued a global alert about a severe form of pneumonia (now known as Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome – SARS) that was affecting people in China, Hong Kong and Vietnam.



TOADS AHOY!

This month common toads all over the country will be on the move, heading back to the breeding ponds where they themselves were spawned. Sadly, many will never make it, because of busy roads.



If you like toads, you can help them by joining the Toads on Roads project. It keeps a sharp eye out for 'migratory crossings' on certain roads. It helps the toads to cross safely, by coordinating local Toad Patrols who will actively help the toads get across the road, and also putting up road warning signs for motorists.
