#### **Dear Friends**

Happy New Year! I know it is starting to feel a bit late and tatty to be still talking of New Year, but this is the first Parish Magazine of 2024. It is also the first Vicar's letter of the interregnum, following the farewell service for Steve, and of course Elaine, Samuel, and Phoebe. Although it was a very sad day, I believe we gave them a great 'St Johns Farewell'. Thank you to all those who baked, and helped it to be a great send off. It was lovely to see the church full. Also thank you to those of vou who gave towards a leaving gift. The churchwardens were able to give Steve a generous cheque, which will no doubt be useful as they move into their brand-new home. Some of you will know that Steve is taking up a senior officer's role in the Diocese, working out of Church House and this post does not come with a house. Their new home will be in Burley-in-Wharfedale, but currently the walls are only about 6 feet high! Consequently, they will be renting the vicarage until about March, when hopefully the builders will have completed their new home. This means that you may see them still around for a while yet, walking Pepper and doing the school run for Phoebe. Also, for the more vigilant among us, that is why it looks like there is still some one living in the Vicarage.

So, New Year brings New Beginnings and some things done differently. Firstly, it is me writing this letter, yes, the 'Associate', the one currently off sick! However, there are somethings I can do to help, and for the time being this is one of those things. Every interregnum brings challenges, but I also believe it brings new opportunities. We will all have to take extra special care of each other, and whilst St Johns has a history of people stepping forward to volunteer, we will need this willingness to 'have a go' like we haven't over the last 6 years. It would be good to have different people writing this letter maybe, and certainly we will need willing helpers to assist with Zest, and with aspects of the 11am service. Different priests will be visiting each week and we will of course make them welcome in the hope that they will want to come and help us again on further Sundays, we need to make new faces feel welcome. Its always a joy to welcome new people, but as the word gets around that we are in vacancy, we may get 'undercover clergy' visiting to 'sniff us out!'. One thing is clear, things will change, and for those of us who are anxious about change, it is important to remind ourselves that Gods vision and mission is bigger than all of us. Our responsibility is to be faithful, to trust that we are part of Gods Story here in Menston, and to pray that He continues to hold us in His hands, and to fill us with his Spirit.

Finally, a word about the process. Many of you will remember the process from six years ago when we needed a priest to replace Ruth. A new vicar does not arrive quickly. The churchwardens and the PCC are working as quickly as they can to prepare all the documents and launch our vacancy. The Area Dean, The Archdeacon, and Bishop Toby will be doing all they can to help bring the right person into post. Following a meeting of the area mission and pastoral committee, discussion took place about our vacancy and the best way to provide a new incumbent. With prayer they agreed that whilst it is not necessarily the outcome that some might hope for, a half-time priest being paired again with the half-time assistant diocesan director of ordinands ( in other words exactly the same as Steve's role) would be the best way of ensuring that we get a new priest.

As you can see there is a lot to pray for, please do continue to prayer for the wardens, who have a significant amount of responsibility during an interregnum, and continue to pray for each other as we carry on being Gods people here in Menston. Amen

#### A View from The Pews by Dominic Hall

There is a well-worn saying that life is a series of meetings and partings. We have begun the year in Menston with a significant parting. Steve was the eighth vicar at St. John's since the end of the Second World War. I am not sure if any of you remember Thomas Hammond. I am sure some may have distant memories of Ralph Place. Michael Heckingbottom may have performed marriages or christenings for some of you. Irvin Wilson, John Ward, David Clarke and Ruth Yeoman will all stir memories of worship, church moments and community. We can now, with some sadness, place Steve Proudlove into those memory banks.

This means we have an interregnum whilst those in a position to do so seek a new Vicar to lead us into the second quarter of the twenty-first century!

An interregnum is a period, according to the dictionary, when a throne is vacant or the normal functions of a government are suspended between administrations. In other countries this might have more meaning but in the UK the throne is never vacant – Charles became King the moment his mother died; governmental power flows smoothly between parties or people depending on how the transition has occurred. The word is used almost exclusively with reference to vacancies in the Church.

What we do during the interregnum is up to the congregation. Of course, there are practical and administrative things to be done. The wardens, PCC and others will be working hard behind the scenes to make sure you hardly notice the changes. However, the congregation does have a clear voice. You may well be asked your views on the sort of vicar that should be appointed. It is a chance to shape the future of worship in our church. Inevitably there will be a range of opinions as to what the next vicar should be like. Do we want someone with a family? Would we want someone older and established or a young and energetic type? How will their views on a Christian approach to life meld with our own? Is the pastoral more important than the theologian?

These are just some of the questions we have to ask and answer during the next few months. To do so prayerfully and to chat with others in the congregation should help us to bring in to focus the vision of the person we would like to lead us through the rest of the 2020s and into the 2030s.

I hope we can all take time to open ourselves to God and that by this time next year we have a vicar we can trust, listen to and love as much as we did Steve.

## **P**rayer Points



February is a special month, partly because it is the shortest month, but also because it has an extra day this year (the 29th) making 2024 a leap year (according to the Gregorian calendar.

#### February 14th ~ Ash Wednesday

So begins the 40 days of Lent, a time when we remember that Jesus spent 40 days in the desert fasting and resisting temptation. Lord, help us to do likewise, observing the period of Lent.

#### St Valentine's Day

St Valentine was executed on this day by the Roman emperor, Claudius (a pagan) for marrying soldiers in the Christian tradition (which was forbidden as Claudius felt they should dedicate themselves to their duties as soldiers.) Let us love one another, for love comes from God.

With Lent staring on 14 February here are some thoughts from the A Rocha / Eco church community:

The Lenten 40-day period before Easter gives us the opportunity to reflect on the practice of fasting and commit to giving up something that brings a real benefit to nature and helps address climate change. Below are some changes you could make that will help the environment. Take time to pray, reflect and consider these options – pick one or two or however many you'd like (you never know the changes might just stick!).

- Switch off from digital. Explore technology-free times or areas of the house, switching to 'airplane mode' for the first hour in the morning and the last hour at night, 'switch off Sundays', reaching for your Bible over your device(s) and writing a list of outdoor things that you enjoy.
- Buy local make us of the refill facility at our local NISA
- Try a plant-based recipe or diet.

- Change your method of transport. How about walking or cycling for repeated errands, choosing one day a week to walk, cycle or take public transport to work where you are able to.
- Move your money. Could you divest from fossil fuels and support a bank which invests in renewables?'.

#### **PCC Notes**

PCC met early in January to ensure a smooth transfer into the interregnum period. The meeting focused primarily on the running of church business during this period and around the process of finding the right vicar to join our St John's family.

The PCC hope you will all feel confident that there are robust plans and teams in place to ensure that the services will continue as normal. We have visiting clergy booked to cover the 11am and Thursday morning services for several weeks with a willing team running the Zest services in house and added back up support from Andrew and Wendy where needed.

The interregnum process is underway with the Parish Profile and Parish Brochure being compiled by a small team in time for a Section 11 meeting at the end of January. At this meeting these important documents will be finalised and two members of the PCC will be appointed to represent the PCC during the selection of a new incumbent.

#### In other news:

**Finance** The treasurer reported a bank balance for the end of November 2023 of £25,961.64. The balance for the end of December 2023 has not been finalised following a banking

error in paying share for the month but this will be rectified in January to enable the end of year figures to be finalised and reported at the next meeting. Thanks was noted to those who organised the wonderful Christmas Quiz Supper which raised £514 for church funds. The treasurer will be coming to speak to all the congregations later this month to explain and encourage use of the new Parish Giving Scheme, details of which can also be found at the back of the church.

#### **Churchyard closure**

The Ministry of Justice has now opened a 28-day period of community engagement to take any response to the proposed closure.

**Thank yous** Thank you wishes were recorded for the lovely Christmas trees that came from Acrecliffe and the beautiful festive flower arrangements created by our flower arranging team. Steve and family also sent heartfelt thanks to all those who organised, provided food and attended their leaving event on the 7 January.

**APCM** The dates for the PCC meetings in 2024 were discussed and approved, with the APCM due to be held on Sunday 28 April 2024.

- coercive control; financial abuse; cyber abuse are some of the most common.


