Its doesn't mean it won't be uncomfortable. Anyone who has been part of a group knows that it is not possible for everyone to get everything their own way all the time. Being welcoming and inclusive is radical - but for the love of God might we challenge ourselves to be ever more generous and ever more willing to think of others first.
