

The Vicarage

Dear Friends

I am writing the article just after our APCM (Annual Parochial Church Meeting) for the year 2024. It probably was a bit long! Sorry! And well done for those who came and endured. But in some ways, I am not too apologetic for the length.

The year 2024 gave us much to reflect on and give thanks for imagine if we had nothing to share and no-one to say thank you to?! It is important to take stock once a year, to be reflective and to take a moment to say ves that happened and ves, we did that, and ves God met us there.

It is too easy to always be looking ahead, and I can be very guilty of quickly moving on to the next problem to solve, the next thing on my to do list!

Remembering and reflecting is an important spiritual discipline. The Bible calls us time and time again to remember. Whether that is Jesus at the last supper, St Paul speaking to the churches, Moses reminding the Israelites or the Prophets calling the exiled to recall past deliverance.

This time last year you didn't know if anyone would even apply for the post of vicar, would God call anyone to St John's? Would he be faithful to this place and send someone to join in and lead?

Would St John's cope during interregnum, would you remain faithful, or turn away?

This time last year I did not know where God would call me next and what that would look like for my family and I.

Morning Prayer has been taking us through the early chapters of Deuteronomy - where the Israelites having been in the wilderness, are on the cusp of going into the Promised Land. I am struck by God's Word through Moses in Deuteronomy 6:10-12: When the Lord your God brings you into the land he swore to your fathers, to Abraham,






and the streets outside



But God does not call us to an anxious state, or to fearful obedience. Rather he calls us to remember his faithfulness and his love, to lean into it and respond to it, in times of plenty, and in times of need.

Remembering how faithful God has been to us, and how we have responded to that is good spiritual discipline. It keeps us focussed on the source of all good things, and will enable us to quickly recall his past victories when we face the next trial of life.

God is good.

He was faithful to us in 2024, and he will be faithful to us again in the year ahead.

Let us look to Him and listen.

A View from The Pews by Dominic Hall

I have a colleague from Latvia. She is excited as she and her family prepare for midsummer at the end of the month. There will be a huge gathering of Latvians – and others – at a camp site in the Midlands to sing and dance, eat and drink and celebrate together a festival important to their community.

It reminded me of the way we came together as a country in May to mark the 80th anniversary of VE Day. The flags and the bunting, locked away after the Coronation, got another springtime outing as we marked an occasion important to our own communities.

Throughout the world there are dates and moments that bring joy to different people. The recent election of Pope Leo XIV was a cause for rejoicing and hope among Roman Catholics. June marks Pride month, a festival of great significance to the LGBTQ+ communities. Late April saw the anniversary of Vietnamese reunification – celebrated with gusto and delicious food by my Vietnamese learners.

I believe these stories are evidence of our desire to exist in like-minded groups. It helps to give us identity, a sense of belonging and a grounding in the continuation of our histories. There is, however, a downside to this. We can begin to exist in a bubble and engage in cultural superiority. There is a fine line between celebrating that which speaks to us and deriding that which does not.

So how do we stop ourselves from falling into the trap of thinking we are better than the rest? One way, of course, is to engage with other communities and see why their celebrations and commemorations are important to them. I was able to spend time with my Vietnamese learners as they celebrated their nation. I can vouch for the delicious food and the deep sense of pride they have for their country and its traditions. I can tell you, however, that I will not be camping with a load of well-libated Latvians to celebrate the longest day! I will join in marking the occasion in a more private manner and by wishing my colleague, her family and friends a joyous time. We do not need to understand the importance of these occasions, only to know that in bringing joy to others they are worthwhile.

When we reach out and embrace the cultures and traditions of others it is just as important as when we work to preserve our own. Celebrating and marking that which makes us all special increases our own sense of worth and value — and that is surely a very good thing.

This month sees the great Christian festival of Pentecost. Fifty days after Easter. All the followers of Jesus were gathered together in Jerusalem for the Spring grain festival of Shavuot. It is also when Jewish people remember Moses receiving the commandments on Mount Sinai. I have since heard that Client Earth - one of the charities to identify in the quiz has secured this statement from Coca Cola:

Coca-Cola will change some of its labelling practices to remove misleading recycling claims in a move announced by the European Commission following a greenwashing complaint that we supported.

Misleading claims you may recognise such as 'I am a bottle made from 100% recycled plastic' will be replaced across the EU, and Coca-Cola will also ensure that product labels and marketing materials do not mislead consumers about the environmental benefits of the packaging, including the use of green imagery or symbols. A Universal Prayer of Humility

Whilst in hospital at the end of his life on earth, the late Pope Francis referred people to the following prayer. It is a prayer that speaks of how to overcome the trivialities of life and focus on that which should be important to us all. There is no evidence that he wrote the prayer.

The walls of hospitals have heard more honest prayers than churches. They have witnessed far more sincere kisses than those in airports. It is in hospitals that you see a homophobe being saved by a gay doctor, a privileged doctor saving the life of a beggar. In intensive care, you see a Jew taking care of a racist, a police officer and a prisoner in the same room receiving the same care, a wealthy patient waiting for a liver transplant, ready to receive the organ from a poor donor.

It is in these moments, when the hospital touches the wounds of people, that different worlds intersect according to a divine design. And in this communion of destinies, we realize that alone, we are nothing. The absolute truth of people, most of the time, only reveals itself in moments of pain or in the real threat of an irreversible loss.

A hospital is a place where human beings remove their masks and show themselves as they truly are, in their purest essence.

This life will pass quickly, so do not waste it fighting with people. Do not criticize your body too much. Do not complain excessively. Do not lose sleep over bills. Make sure to hug your loved ones. Do not worry too much about keeping the house spotless. Material goods must be earned by each person - do not dedicate yourself to accumulating an inheritance.

You are waiting for too much: Christmas, Friday, next year, when you have money, when love arrives, when everything is perfect.

Listen, perfection does not exist. A human being cannot attain it because we are simply not made to be fulfilled here. Here, we are given an opportunity to learn. So, make the most of this trial of life - and do it now.

Respect yourself, respect others. Walk your own path and let go of the path others have chosen for you. Respect: do not comment, do not judge, do not interfere.

Love more, forgive more, embrace more, live more intensely! And leave the rest in the hands of the Creator.


LADIES PLEASE CONCERT
